LSU Department of Pediatrics Town Hall

The meeting provided an opportunity for Dr. Moulton to discuss the overarching goals of the department and recognize their alignment with closely affiliated institutions, Tulane University and Children's Hospital. LSU Pediatric Emergency Medicine (PEM) Fellowship



Beginning this past September, the Pediatric Emergency Medicine (PEM) Fellowship at Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center and Children's Hospital New Orleans has been trailblazing the medical frontier as the first and only pediatric emergency medicine fellowship in the state of Louisiana. With a mission to offer a well-rounded experience that includes not only an outstanding education but also unmatched support and mentorship, the program is sure to gain attention as it transforms the scope of Pediatric Emergency Medicine at LSU Pediatrics.

As the Program Director, Dr. Patrick Ryan with the support of Dr. Julia Schweizer, Associate Program Director, have been conducting interviews over the past few months, evaluating an eager and promising group of applicants. Without surprise, two outstanding applicants recently matched and will begin fellowship next year.

Fellows enrolled in the program will navigate the complexities of pediatric emergency conditions, gaining hands-on experience in the evaluation and management of cases ranging from trauma and shock to respiratory distress and infection.

Moreover, the curriculum extends beyond traditional emergency scenarios, providing exposure to a diverse range of pediatric-related topics, including child abuse and neglect, mental and behavioral health, child advocacy, and public health.

By offering a unique blend of clinical and research opportunities in a world-class children's hospital, this

fellowship equips participants with the knowledge and skills essential to emerge as leaders in the dynamic field of pediatric emergency medicine.

Dr. Jamilah Hackworth, from Cincinnati Children's Hospital, served as a Visiting Professor at CHNOLA from October 17th-19th. During her three-day visit, Dr. Hackworth hosted educational sessions with residents and fellows, as well as a faculty development session. Her presentation with the pediatric fellows examined some of the origins of mistrust of the medical community in Black and minoritized communities. Her Grand Rounds presentation, "From Bystander to Upstander: Choosing Courage over Comfort," provided more than 220 attendees with concrete instruction for confronting microaggressions in the healthcare setting.

Dr. Hackworth also spent time with departmental leadership as well as members of the Physicians Underrepresented in Medicine Alliance (PUMA), consulting on current projects and the future trajectories of diversity, equity, and inclusion-related initiatives. Dr. Hackworth's visit was organized by Dr. Bonnie Desselle and her team in the CHNOLA Office of Medical Education.

Gender-diverse Youth Social



In a world that increasingly recognizes the importance of inclusivity and connection, the 3rd Gender Diverse Youth event, held on October 26th, 2023, stands as a shining example of how the healthcare sector can help foster strong communities. The driving force behind this gathering was the dedicated



planning team comprised of the LSU Pediatric Adolecent Medicine administrative team, Hannah Simon and Tatjana Saunders, as well as LSU Pediatrics Vice Chair of Community Health and Advocacy, Dr. Ryan Pasternak, and Children's Hospital New Orleans Adolecent Medicine Practice Administrator, Nina Keiser. Their collective vision, in conjunction with support from Children's Hospital, brought to life an event tailored to the specific needs of gender diverse patients, their families, and the wider community.

The vision of this initiative emerged from the voices of patients themselves. As the LSU Pediatrics Adolescent Medicine program rapidly expanded in 2018, emerged was the clear indication that increased community support for gender-diverse youth and their families was essential. Parents expressed a desire to connect with families who could relate to their unique experiences, and physicians, noticing that patients lived in close proximity, recognized the need for a social platform where these families could be introduced. The result was the Gender Diverse Youth Social.

This year's event welcomed 48 attendees, including gender-diverse patients already accessing services and care from Children's Hospital New Orleans and outside clinical parrners. The evening featured ice-breaking activities, introductions to providers and services, a lively DJ'd dance party, and access to resource tables from partners. Most importantly, it provided a space where people could engage in meaningful conversations and establish connections.

Hannah Simon emphasized the team effort that helped made the event a success. With numerous supporters and partners eager to get involved, many thanks goes out to The Parenting Center, PFLAG, Café Reconcile, Tubby + Coo, Crescent Care, NOLAHype, Juan's Flying Burrito and Lindsay Keen.

With hopes to continue hosting such events into 2024, LSU Pediatrics aspires to build a continuing sense of community for patients and their families.
