

<u>Dr. Rajesh Mohandas</u> (Nephrology) recently published this paper on the relative safety of erythropoiesis-stimulating agents (ESA) in *Clinical Pharmacology & Therapeutics*. The authors found long-acting ESAs were associated with lower risk of all-cause mortality, with no difference in the risk of major cardiovascular adverse vents when compared to short-acting ESAs.

<u>Dr. Ian Crimmins</u> (EM Resident) and <u>Dr. David Beran</u> (Emergency Medicine) recently published a case report in the *Journal of the American College of Emergency Physicians* describing a patient with traumatic tension pneumocephalus with CT images showing a classic "Mount Fuji sign".







<u>Dr. Paul Harch</u> (Emergency Medicine) recently published a case report on dementia sensitivity to altitude changes and treatment with hyperbaric air and glutathione precursors published in the *Frontiers in Neurology*. The authors showed cognitive deteriorations and improvements in a patient with dementia with hypobaric/hypoxic motor vehicle ascents and descents from altitude (in the Rocky Mountains). Temporary beneficial motor vehicle descents were replicated in a hyperbaric chamber.





Shout out to Dr. Sabo

<u>Dr. Scott Sabo</u> (EM Resident) was recently acknowledged for going above and beyond the "usual". We received the following email from a member of the New Orleans EMS.

"I responded to a death today and called for DNAR orders via radio. After giving me his name and the official time, Dr. Sabo asked me to give his condolences to the family members present on the scene.

In the 17 years that I have been a paramedic, this was the first time this has ever happened to me. The family members expressed their gratitude to him immediately, and the moment was very grounding for me. We respond to obvious deaths, traumatic deaths, or otherwise non-workable arrests several times a week, sometimes even several times a day. This moment was a reminder for me to remain just as present and com-passionate for these simple calls as I do for a workable cardiac arrest. It was such a small gesture on his part, but I truly believe things like that within medicine have a greater impact than we realize.
