In the last six months, we have made incredible strides in resident education. We have brought it three national speakers, and we are planning on four more by the end of June. We have sent dozens of residents to present their work and research at national conferences including Academic Surgical Congress, Southeastern Surgical Congress, Society of Surgical Oncology, American Burn Association, and more. This April, three of our education leadership faculty and three of our coordinators are attending the Surgical Education Week to learn from and share with other program directors and coordinators from around the country.

We've had multiple town halls and small group listening sessions with all the residents and fellows across our programs. We are excited to begin a resident research group to provide new collaboration opportunities and more support for the residents interested in surgical research.

Starting with the new academic year, we will be making some changes to didactics, aligning our educational conferences between New Orleans and Baton Rouge campuses. We want to increase our in-service exam scores, board pass rates, and overall general knowledge within the residency programs.


### RESEARCH UPDATES

# **ROBERT BATSON, MD, FACS**




This January, the distinguished Dr. Robert C. Batson retired from the LSU School of Medicine. To say that he is missed would be an understatement. Dr Batson joined the Surgery faculty at LSU Medical Center in 1976. He served as the Program Director of the Vascular Surgery fellowship from 1980-1989, and again in 1996-2005, and Chief of the Section of Vascular Surgery from 1996 to 2011. In 2010, after a vacancy in leadership, he was appointed Interim Chair of the Department of Surgery and was shortly thereafter named Chair in 2011.

Dr Batson has many awards and accolades to his name, including membership in Alpha Omega Alpha, recipient of the Shipley Award of the Southern Surgical Association, and on the Board of Directors of the Gulf Coast Vascular Society, LSU Medical Alumni Association, and the LSU Medical Center Foundation. He has served as President of the Louisiana Chapter of the American College of Surgeons, the James D. Rives Surgical Society, the Jesse E. Thompson Vascular Society, New Orleans Surgical Society, Peripheral Vascular Surgery Society, Surgical Association of Louisiana. He has over 30 refereed published manuscripts.

Dr Batson's greatest legacy, however, can be seen in the generations of surgical residents and fellows trained under his watchful eye. During his tenure as Chair, he saw over 100 residents and fellows graduate from LSU New Orleans. The General Surgery Residency grew from 8 graduating chiefs per year to 11, becoming one of the largest programs in the country. There was addition of integrated Vascular and Plastic Surgery programs; Colorectal, Minimally Invasive/Metabolic Surgery Fellowships; and recruitment of nationally prominent surgeons to lead clinical programs. He loved to teach, and we were honored to be able to name the Robert C. Batson Faculty Award this year.

Dr. Batson has been a pillar of our department for decades, and he has graciously agreed to continue to serve as a mentor to our residents and faculty. He has received an Emeritus appointment within our department. Please join us in expressing our profound gratitude to Dr. Batson for his service to our department and our institution.



I have a brother who is 2 years older than me and we've always been close. He went to LSU medical school as well, and when he was a third-year student on his surgery rotation he called me one day and said "Paige, you are such a surgeon." Then, I had surgery as my first block of third year (With Dr. Chris Johnson and Dr. Blake Platt as my residents). As I went through all the other specialties throughout the year, I kept thinking back to my surgery rotation because that was what I envisioned "being a doctor" to look like. I've always been super creative and artistic surgery combined academics with creativity and it captivated me in a way that was unexpected.

This research year was a decision that I made for a variety of reasons, but ultimately a gut feeling. Dr. Smith, Dr. Phelan, and Dr. Carter created an opportunity for me that I will never be able to thank them enough for.

My biggest project, and the one with the steepest learning curve this year, has been our mice wound healing model. We had the opportunity to travel to Washington DC in January and spend the day at a lab that is experienced in mice wound models to get tips for setting up our experiments.





The overarching aim of this project is to create burns on these mice and study the tensile strength, microbiome, and histology of wound healing 9 days after the burn injury in mice that will be treated with different combinations of cytokines and antibiotics. Before this year I couldn't have told you the difference between a mouse and a rat (which is a big deal to mix up, I learned), and now I know more than I ever should admit about mice.

There have been several other projects we have been working on, and all-in-all I couldn't have asked for a better experience this year. Having this opportunity within our program is something I am proud to tell people we have at LSU, and I'm excited to see how many amazing things future residents are able to accomplish under Dr. Smith's guidance in the years to come.
